Days Homeless Takeaways

“Overall, given the sample sizes, there do not seem to be huge disparities in most categories”

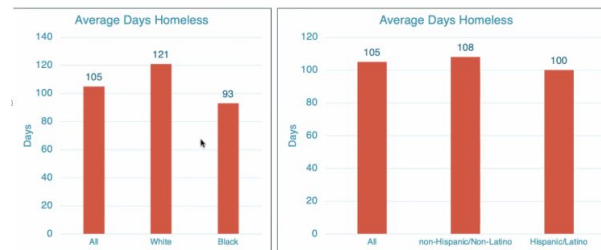
Families with children (avg 123 days)

- Major disparity observed between **Black parenting youth** and White parenting youth - Ave 112 days; Black 112 days; White 63 days
- Asian had one household with 380 days

Singles (avg 104 days)

- No substantial differences between different racial groups observed

No major disparities in length of time homeless

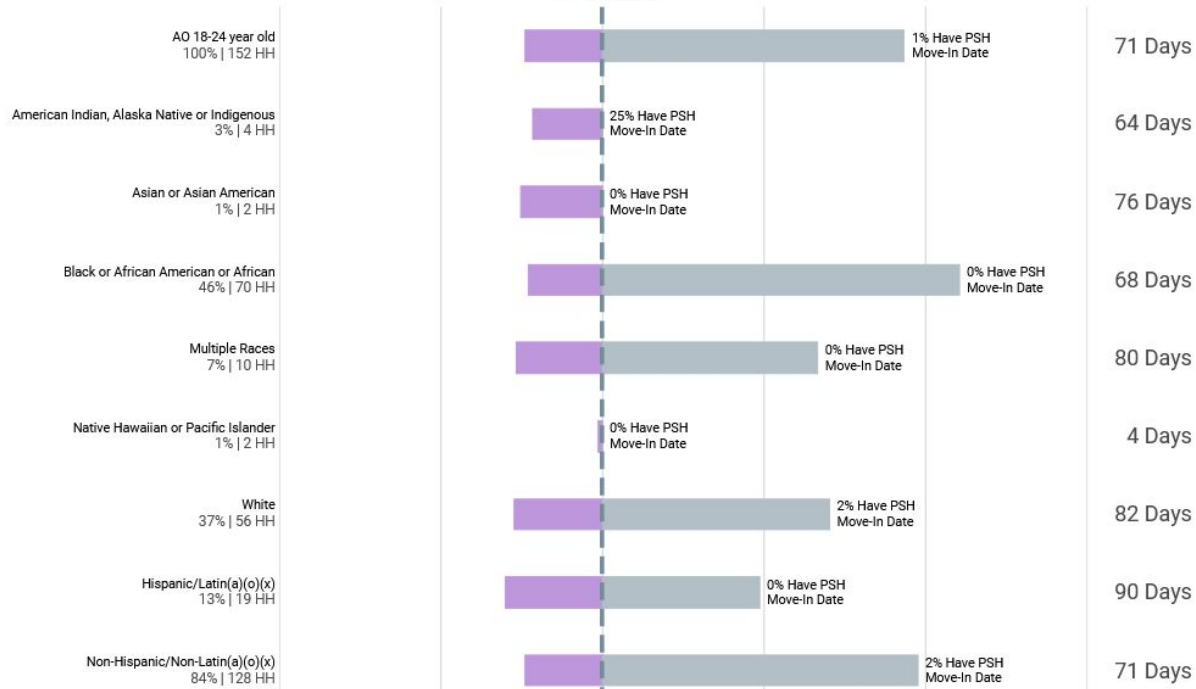


Days Homeless: Singles, Youth Age 18-24

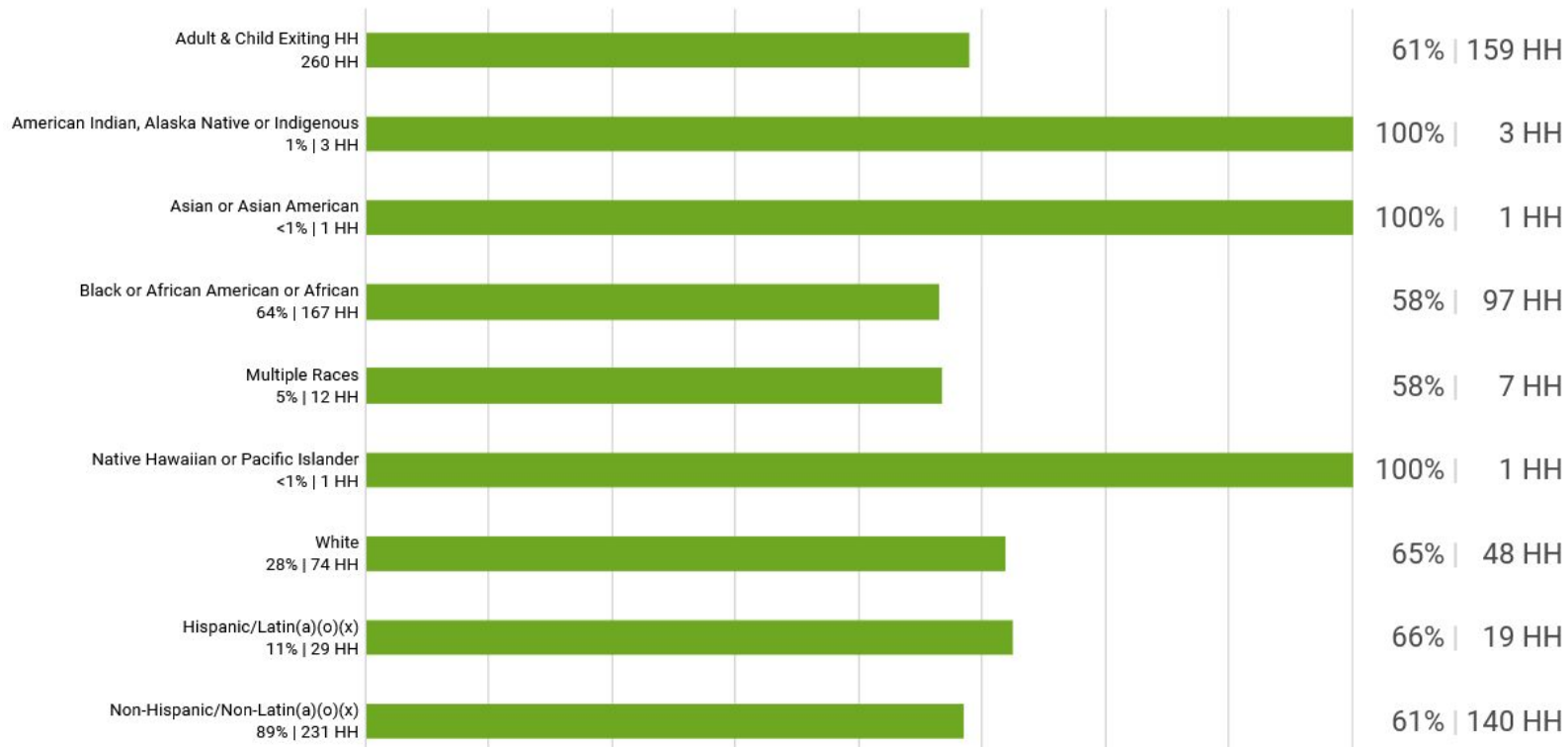

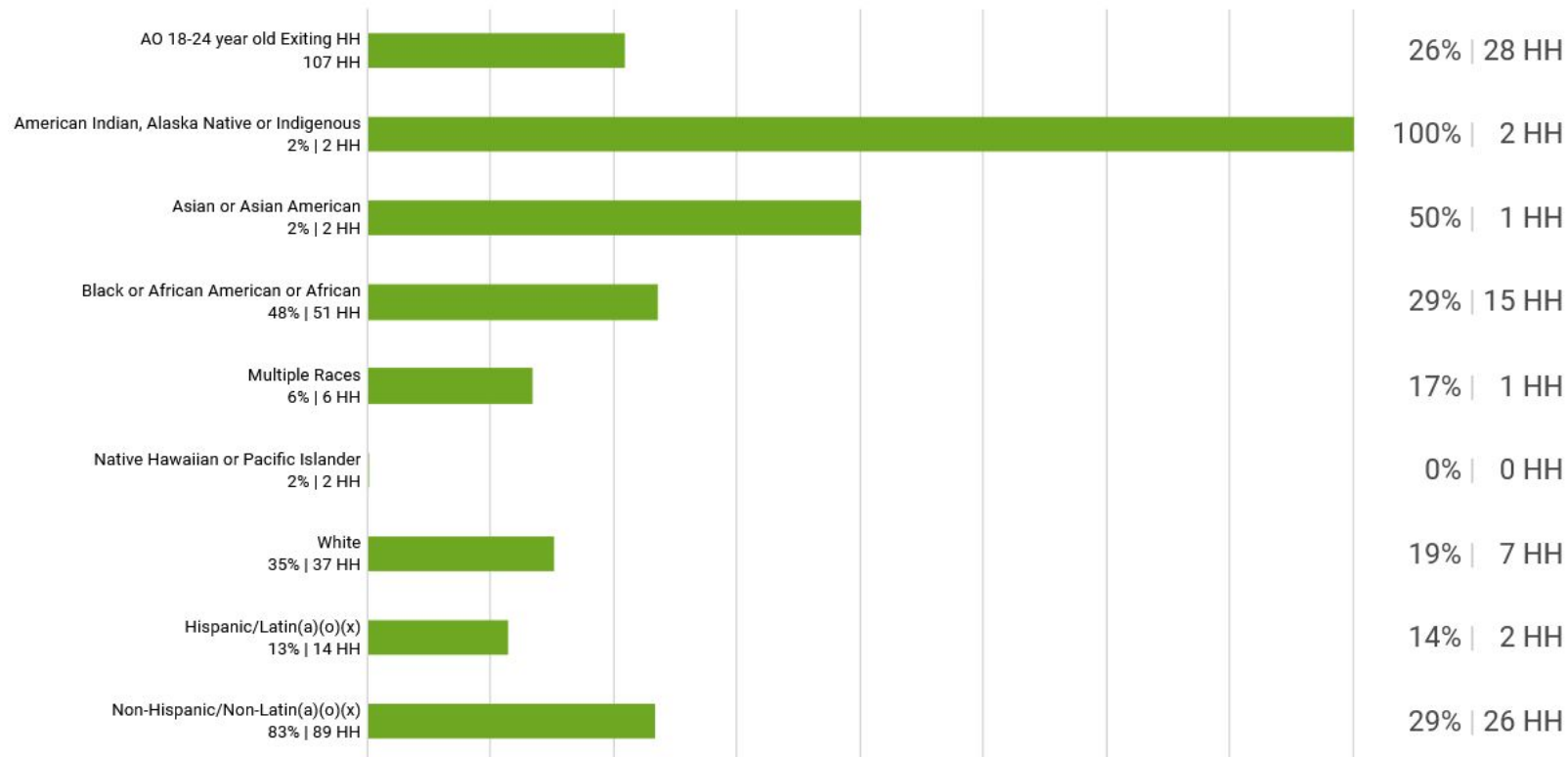

Discussion: Exit to Permanent Destinations

1. Where are the greatest inequities showing up?

Families with children (avg 61%)

- Disparities observed between **Black/Multiple Races families** and White families - Black 58%; Multiple Races 58%; White 65%

Singles (avg 19%)

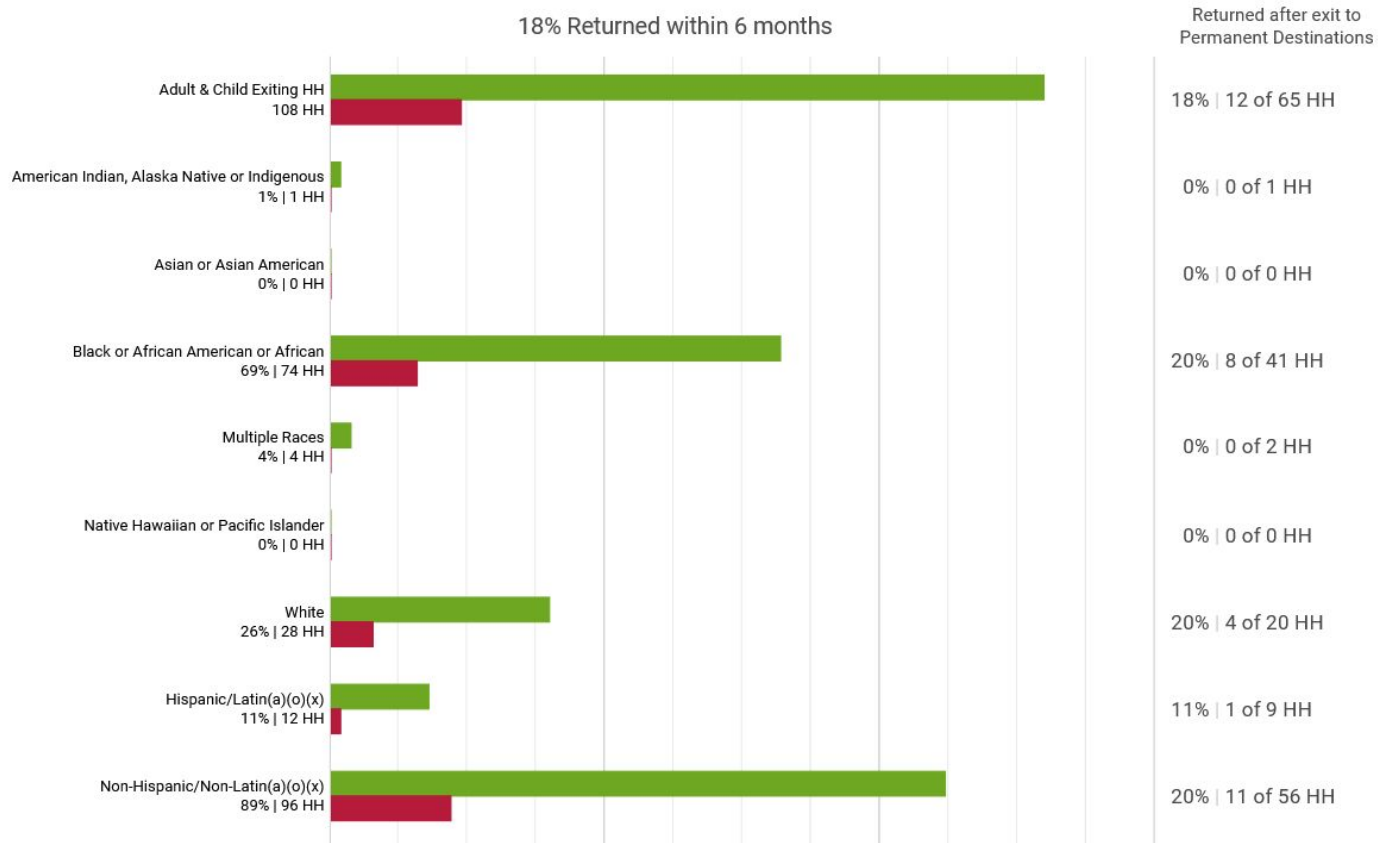
- No substantial differences between different racial groups observed

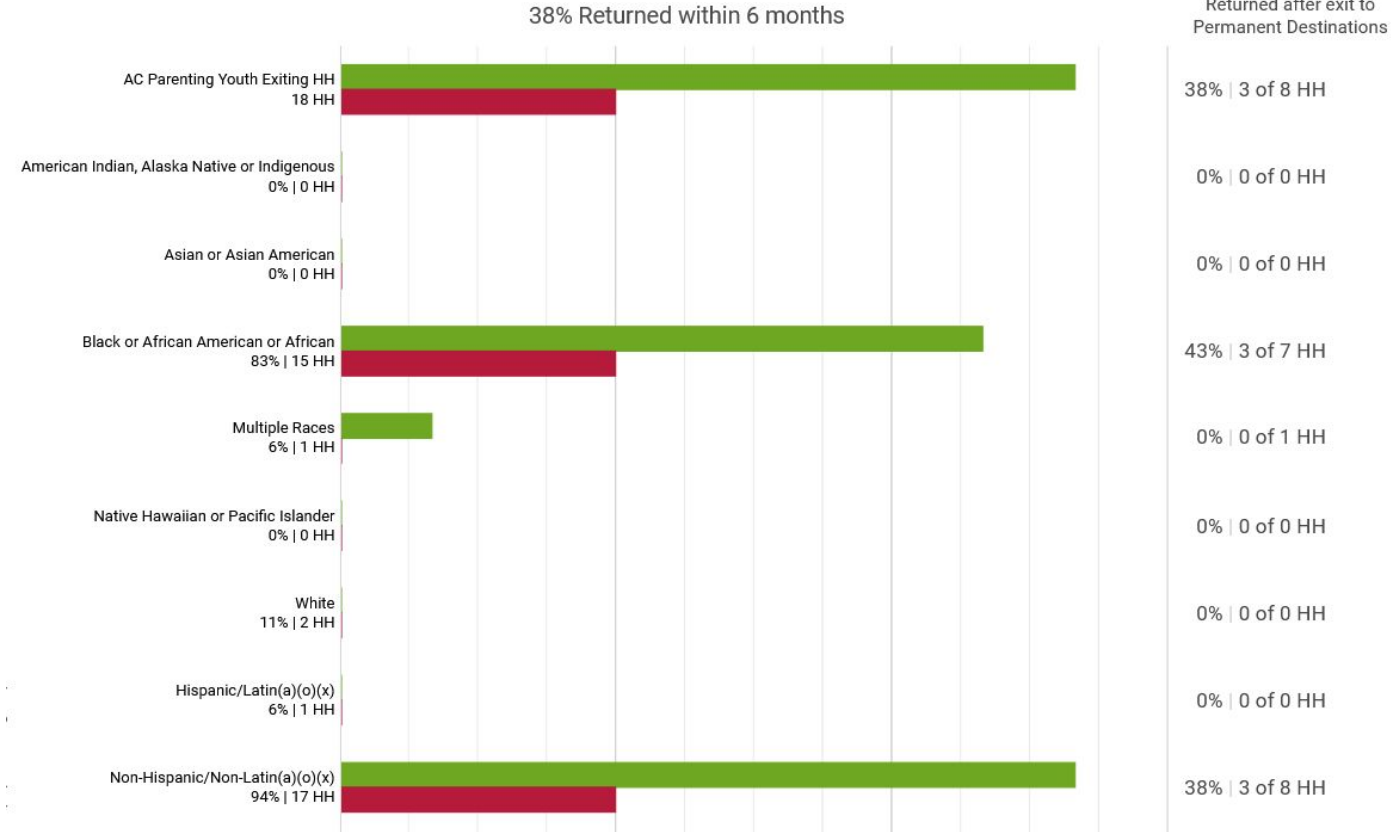

FY 2022 (10/1/21-9/30/23)

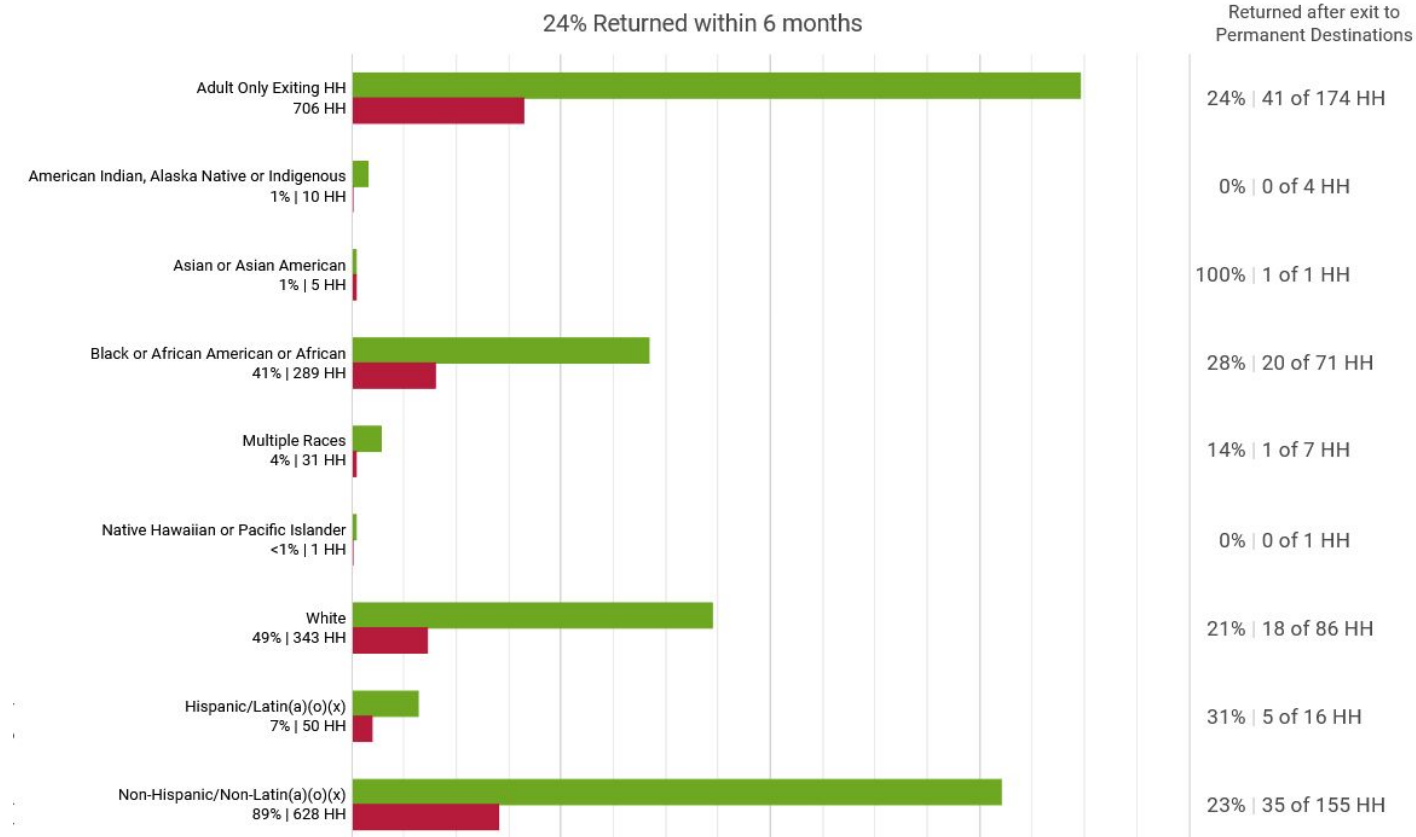
Return to Homeless: Families with Children



Return to Homeless: Families with Children, Parenting Youth Age 18-24

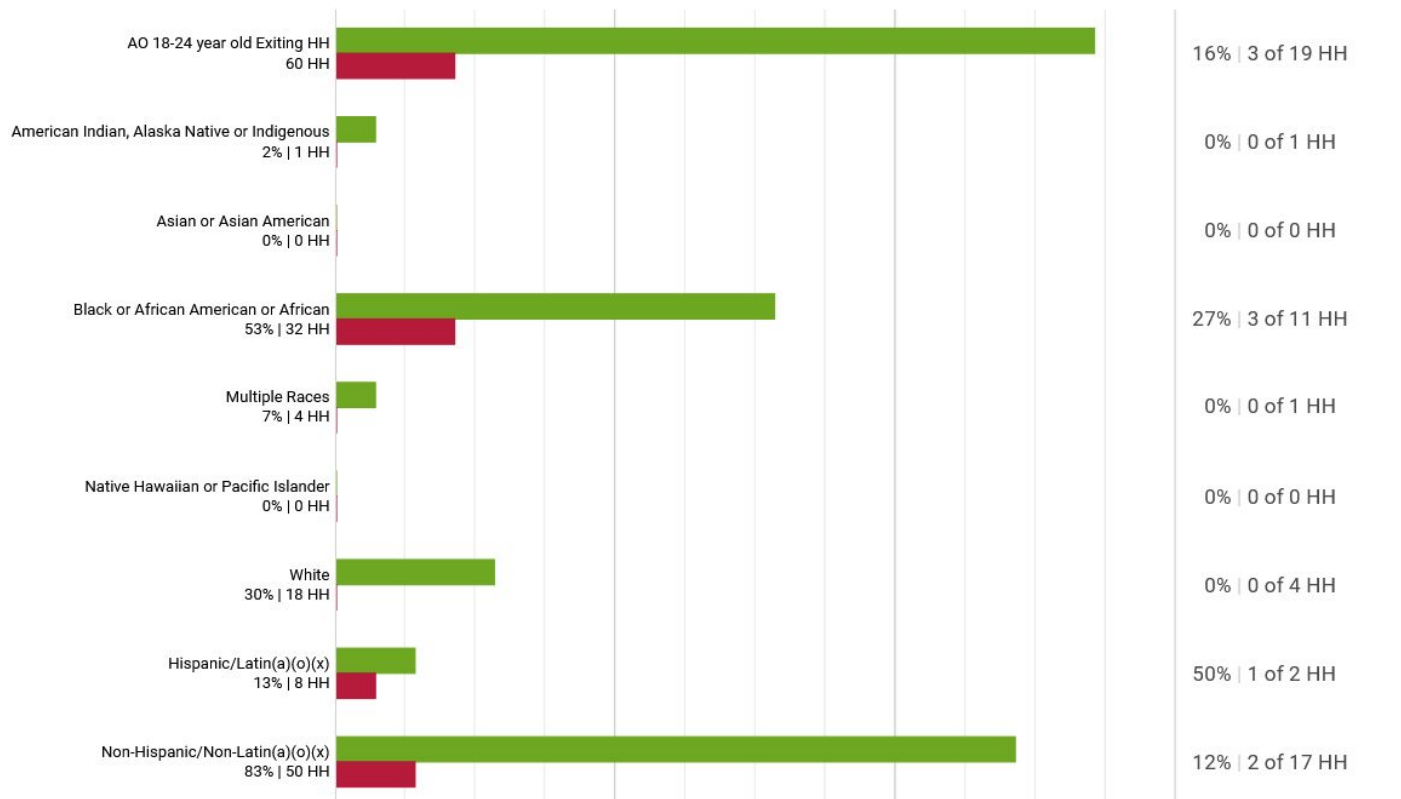


Return to Homeless: Singles

Discussion: Return to Homelessness

1. Where are the greatest inequities showing up?

Families with children (avg 18%)

- No substantial differences between different racial groups observed

Singles (avg 24%)

Disparities observed between

- **Black singles** and white singles - Black 28%; White 21%
- **Hispanic singles** and Non-Hispanic singles - Hispanic 31%; Non-Hispanic 23%
- **Black single youth** and White single youth - Black youth 27%; White youth 0%
