Getting to Know You:

Christie Howell-Yrios



What is your job and how long have you been at it?

I have worked at Animal Crackers, Inc. childcare center since 1993, and I have served in many different capacities. I currently serve as the Executive Director and 4K Teacher, but have also served as a Summer Camp Counselor, a School-Age Teacher, a Preschool Teacher, the Financial Administrator, and the Assistant Director.

What does a typical day look like?

Animal Crackers, Inc. is a City of Madison Accredited/ 5 STAR Program. The Center's philosophy is to offer all children an educationally and emotionally balanced program in a safe, child-centered environment of warmth and friendlessness. Children are given opportunities to explore, experiment and question while engaging in hands-on active learning activities. This approach is integral when supporting families facing hardships, especially homelessness. No two days are the same, which makes this work both challenging and exciting. I work with a great group of people who are dedicated to the empowerment of all families.

How does your work intersect with homelessness in our community?

Our center prioritizes families who are facing all types of obstacles and barriers, homelessness being one of them. When children's families facing homelessness, we work with them and other service agencies, to assist in finding adequate and affordable housing. The staff here have supportive, trusting relationships with the families. Animal Crackers, Inc. is a TEP (Transition Education Program) site and has trained staff to assist families in navigating the resources related to housing, shelter, food sources and tuition assistance. We maintain relationships with key service agencies, allowing us to respond as quickly as possible.

What is important for other childcare centers to know about supporting families who are homeless?

Over the last 30 years that I have been in the field of childcare and education, it is evident that the face and structure of homelessness has changed. Service based support is more important than ever when addressing physical health, mental wellbeing and mitigating the risk factors for families who are facing homelessness. It is important that teachers and other staff are trained in supporting children and their families, responsive in addressing the trauma that occurs during homelessness, and have access to professional development in the area of trauma informed care. Animal Crackers, Inc. has a commitment to ongoing and increased collaboration between early childhood programs and service providers to support childcare programs that are serving families facing homelessness. Some of the systems level indicators we use to reflect our commitment in this area are our willingness to:

- Share our budgeting and finance strategies
- Share operational systems that have worked for our agency
- Share any knowledge our agency staff currently has to provide strategies when working with families facing barriers associated with homelessness
- Assist with program policy development
- Provide trauma informed care strategies

What is the best part of your job? The hardest part of your job? The best part of my job is working with a dedicated team of people who always believe we will find a way. Supporting families on multiple levels also affords my ability to work with amazing people in the service community.

The hardest part of my job is having to put families on the waiting list with no definitive date for enrollment.

One random fact about you!

My husband and I went to Preschool together!

One thing you want people to know about doubled up homelessness in early childhood. How can people in the community help?

Unfortunately, homeless numbers will always be inaccurate because there remains an unknown number of doubled-up families that are not counted. It is important to understand that the numbers and percentages given for the homeless population will always be greater than is reported. Reach out to policymakers on a regular basis. Get involved in local organizations whose mission is to work on the expansion of affordable housing and always keep this conversation going, as our community has a long way to go in supporting children and families facing homelessness.
